SHOW SYNOPSIS:

A first-time director for a small community theatre group is given the directorship of a production of Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest*. The show, in its original form, was set to be performed on stage in April 2020. Then, the pandemic strikes. There is pressure from the theatre company to go forward with the production, despite the need for social distancing. Not wanting to blow his chance at a directorial debut, the director agrees to rework the script to make it a bit more modern and virtual-friendly, and plans virtual performances of the show for live streaming.

Flash forward to opening night. The struggle to find actors for a small community theatre production was as challenging as usual, and made even more so by the pandemic. The cast that the director managed to assemble is a motley and semi-dysfunctional "family" that includes, among others, an assistant director who is the understudy for every part; an actress who was off-off-off Broadway in her younger days before moving to this small community, and has little tolerance for anything, but puts up with this nonsense because she wants desperately to play the iconic role of Lady Bracknell; a young actor who has zero acting experience who is pulled in at the last second when one of the other actors doesn't show up; and an actress who is "this close to quitting" the entire time.

This farcical comedy addresses the realities of the struggle to cast and put on any production in community theatre, made even more difficult by the challenges and pitfalls of virtual times. It is an homage to "everything that can go wrong..." farces like *Noises Off* and *The Play that Goes Wrong*, and the wonderful world of community theatre. It is never easy, but the cast manages to include the entire plot of *The Importance of Being Earnest* from beginning to end with various hiccups and detours along the way, showing the indomitable spirit of the stage and those who play on it.

CHARACTER DESCRIPTIONS:

Jonathan Griffith (Director/Lane/Miss Prism/Merriman) - The frazzled first-time director who is trying to keep everything together despite all the mishaps and inevitable things going awry. When numerous actors don't show up for the performance, Jonathan ends up having to fill some of those roles.

Charles Townsend (Assistant Director/Reverend Chasuble/Algernon Moncrief) - An individual who has been with the theatre company for years. He loves the stage, and is always willing to do whatever is needed. In this production, Charles is cast as Reverend Chasuble and is the stand-in for anyone else who is missing from a rehearsal and, as it turns out, the performance itself.

Katherine Davis (Lady Bracknell) - She is perfect for the role of Lady Bracknell because she is cut from the same mold. Serious and self-important, stoic to the point of comedic, she never breaks character even when the walls are caving in all around her.

Jack Baxter (Jack Worthing) - The straight man in all of this. Plays his part, and goes with the flow. He is dependable, calm, humble, and a good actor. He is the actor who is cast as the young lead in every show the troupe performs, because young, dependable, male actors tend to be a rare commodity in community theatre.

Addie Anderson (Cecily) - Youthful, exuberant, and enthusiastic. This is her first play and she is just so excited! Her enthusiasm is infectious... good infectious for her co-stars with positive attitudes and outlooks, "nails on a chalkboard" for the less patient cast members.

Sarah Foster (Gwendolen) - Sarah fancies herself a very talented actress. She is not exactly the right age to play Gwendolen, but tries very hard to act younger than she actually is. She is convinced that she is pulling it off beautifully (she is not). She is constantly on the verge of quitting because she has no patience for anyone else in the cast.

Alex Anderson (Algernon Moncrief) - A last minute addition to the cast, he has zero acting experience and struggles to read the script correctly, especially having problems with names. But oh, is he having fun.

Marcus Madison (Technical Director) - Enthusiastic and capable tech wizard serving mostly behind the scenes as Director of Technology of the show.

NOTES FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT

The story of *Earnest in Isolation began* on Sunday, March 8th, 2020. The Persimmon Tree Players were in the middle of in-person, on-stage rehearsals for their April production of Ken Ludwig's *Moon Over Buffalo*. George Gaige, Chip Staples, and our crew of volunteers had completed the building of our set that weekend. That afternoon, we had our first... and last rehearsal on that set.

Over the next few months, we postponed the show from April to May, then from May to June, then from June to August, and then finally called it quits for 2020. We tried to rehearse on Zoom to prepare for a recorded performance, we talked about turning it into a radio play, and ultimately, we "performed" it as a public reading in camp chairs at the Pleasant Grove pole barn in Fluvanna to an audience of 11 mask-wearing family and friends.

During that time, we met on Zoom to rehearse, to connect, and to try to keep the spirit of the stage alive in times of pandemic and social isolation. Zoom was by no means a perfect medium, but it did at least give a glimmer of hope that the show really COULD go on. It also provided some great comedic moments as we navigated the pitfalls and pratfalls of technology. Fellow cast member, Brooke Agee, and I got to thinking about the idea of a play intended for Zoom and all of the obstacles of trying to do virtual theatre.

I took a summer theatre class at Longwood University, and I chose Oscar Wilde's The Importance of Being Earnest as the play that I would be focusing on during that class. I saw potential in using Earnest as the guiding story for this virtual medium, and began writing.

Earnest in Isolation was born of all of these experiences and obstacles. It is about a community theatre group trying to do exactly what we tried to do this past spring... find ways to keep theatre alive in a time when we were not able to gather together on a physical stage or in the audience. It embraces the love of theatre and the family bonds that theatre creates. It is about rising above the challenges in these times to create and share the stage as actors with an audience.

Much like our *Moon Over Buffalo* experience, Jonathan and the cast and crew have had to reinvent and adapt to the virtual world to share their show with their community. We join them on opening night as they prepare to go live, and what ensues is an homage to Wilde's classic farce, and to the indomitable spirit of community theatre.

One thing that can be said is that good can come out of even the toughest of circumstances, and this is no exception. The fact that all rehearsals and performances are virtual, means that we were able to bring folks together from great distances for this show. Kaye Pearse, who lived here in Central Virginia up until just a few months ago, now lives in Washington State, but is joining us for her PTP debut as the actress portraying Lady Bracknell. Jon Wilson is making his Central Virginia debut from Syracuse, NY as director, Jonathan. We are thrilled to welcome several new local actors to PTP, including Jonathan Karns, Kirk Martini, Kate Green, Ezra Smith and Marcus Dowd, who is also helping out "backstage" as our Production Assistant. PTP regular Jen Starkey joins us as a Director/Producer and the actress playing Gwendolen in *Earnest*. And without our Technical Director/lifesaver, Shannon Montague, who joined PTP for the first time to lend us her invaluable technological expertise, this production would never have made it to your screens.

We are all excited to be able to share this production with you!
